This competition was two weeks later than last year so that we might find an improvement in weather conditions. The plan failed! Although the rain forecast earlier in the week did not materialise, the cold north easterly wind certainly did. Most of us spent the day being thoroughly chilled and the cold beers provided at lunchtime were not welcome.

The fishing was difficult for there was no sign of insect activity. My first fish was spooned and was full of daphnia, so off came the buzzers and on went the lures. By lunch I had two fish and my partner, Steve Mustchin, had none. At lunch several anglers had no fish and the best was three. While eating lunch a bank angler caught one trout right in front of us and we saw another rise, so the plan for the afternoon was clear: fish close in!

By the end of the day Steve had three fish but I did not have another pull. Paul Davies and Dean Epton had both blanked by lunch but in the afternoon took six when anchored ten yards out from the bank.

Apart from the good company the highlight for me was the quality of my two fish. Both were long, lean, full-tailed and silver. My better fish was nineteen inches long yet weighed just 2lb 5oz but still managed to strip the line twice from my reel and turn the boat round.

Results: 1st Paul Davis and Dean Epton (6 fish)
2nd Steve Mustchin and John Plowman
3rd David Painter and Ray Love

A total of 17 fish were caught by 12 anglers. Finally, Ted How generously donated a bottle of whisky to the captor of the smallest fish. This was won by Chris Croucher with a 15oz specimen from his two fish total of 1lb 15oz. *John Plowman*

SUBSCRIPTIONS

You will shortly be receiving a letter from the main Guild advising that the payment of subscriptions will change from this summer onwards. In order to reduce the workload of the treasurer (who for the last several years has been the Chairman, as no volunteers were forthcoming) the main Guild subscription will be simplified. There will be only one membership category at the rate of £20, but if paid by standing order it will be discounted to £15. Family, retired and junior membership rates will be discontinued.

The Branch may also move to standing orders as the preferred means of payment, the date of which can be aligned to the Guild renewal date or remain at 1st September to suit the individual. This would mean two standing orders – one for the Guild and one for the Branch, unless we can come to some agreement with the Guild.

We had been considering an increase in the Branch subscription because our finances are fairly finely balanced, but in view of what is effectively an increase for retired members, it is now proposed that for this year at least the Branch subscriptions should remain unchanged, i.e. £13 for full members and £10 for retired.

However, at least for the time being, the Branch will still accept cash or cheque. It is worth bearing in mind that both Guild and Branch rates have been unchanged for 10 years, thanks to efficiency savings and good management at both levels.

The show was overwhelmingly coarse orientated, with heavy emphasis on carp, but with a few other bright spots such as demonstration of some superb engraving on glass and metal – watch this space for a new trophy, perhaps!

2010 Salmon Fishing on the Lower Tweed

Paul Davis advises he has again been offered a fantastic bargain for back end salmon fishing on the Tweed. The back end fishing on the Tweed is normally dead-man's shoes as it is the most prolific salmon fishing in the UK. One of the Tweed's most prolific low water beats has two separate weeks fishing available for exclusive use. Basically the price reflects the likelihood of numbers of fish.

If the Tweed is unfishable, for a small additional charge we can fish the River Whiteadder (the Tweed and the Whiteadder have different catchment areas so normally if the Tweed is unfishable the Whiteadder is still OK). The price is £20 pppd in August and £35 pppd in September. Therefore, as I will take one rod for each of these weeks, there are other 3 other rods available for both weeks (a rod share is available but you would have to find a rod share partner and the price each would be 50% of the full rod price plus a fee of £50 each).

If you want, partners can also come for an extra £50, as the accommodation on offer is large enough to cope.

If interested, Paul needs definite answers by 21st May, plus a £250 deposit ASAP to secure this offer.

The Fishing

The beat comprises of 1000 yds of right bank fishing (right hand bank = English side) and is made of the Gliddeyhaugh and Canny beats situated just above Norham Bridge. It is opposite the Ladykirk beat (should you want to compare fish stats!). This beat has done exceptionally well in dry years. Its position next to the tidal waters means that it excels in low water when many fish tend to congregate around Norham Bridge as they are forced to wait for higher water. The pools range from 6 to 25 feet, with mainly slow to medium movement depending upon the height. The lower part is easily fished from the bank or by wading, the upper part is fishable only from the boat. The beats have been very lightly fished over recent years.

Cost (see below for the details of what is included)

Week 1 (August)

Accommodation from Sun 15th - Sun 22nd August
Fishing from Mon 16th - Sat 21st August inclusive
Cost £950 per person - A half rod share £525 pp

Week 2 (September)

Accommodation from Sun 19th - Sun 26th September
Fishing from Mon 20th - Sat 25th Sept inclusive
Cost £1300 p p - A half rod share £700 pp

What is included

The price for each **Week 1** includes:

- Monday through Saturday Fishing (6 days)
- We will share a cottage - an ETB 5 crown self catering accommodation 15 miles from the beat - see

and each full rod will have one en-suite double/twin room to themselves.

- Breakfast and lunches
- Boatman/ghillie (for each full rod every 2 days you will spend about 1/2 a day fishing from the boat with the boatman who has over 25 years experience of the beat)
- As I have fished here before I will help/assist ('ghillie') when you are fishing from the bank/wading (NB the wading is easy with a gravel bottom) - but do remember that I will be fishing as well

The price for each **Week 2** includes:

- Monday through Saturday Fishing (6 days)
- We will share a cottage - an ETB 5 crown self catering accommodation right on the beat - see <http://www.crabtreeandcrabtree.com/property-details.html&myPid=11647> and each full rod will have one en-suite double/twin room to themselves.
- Breakfast and lunches
- Boatman/ghillie (for each full rod every 2 days you will spend about 1/2 a day fishing from the boat with the boatman who has over 25 years experience of the beat)
- As I have fished here before I will help/assist ('ghillie') when you are fishing from the bank/wading (NB the wading is easy with a gravel bottom) - but do remember that I will be fishing as well

Not included extras on any week

The cost **does not include:**

- Your travel
- Evening Meals (however we could club together with a kitty and cook or just go down the pub)
- Boatman/ghillie tip (suggested is £10-£15 pppd i.e. £60 -£90 for the week)
- NB: You don't need an EA salmon/sea trout licence as the river is under Scottish law.
